"Make Room for the Child"

Advent is the traditional start of the Christian year, a full month before the rest of the world's calendars expire-- as if to imply that Christians are in some sense *already living in the future!* The scripture readings for the Advent season seem precisely intended to soften and stretch our imaginations about that future-- because every Advent we encounter stories of miracles, unlikely prophesies, expectations both grim and wild for the world's great metamorphosis!

Late in the Advent season, those rumours of transformation are best embodied in the "Magnificat" sung by the young pregnant Mary (read Luke 1:46-55). Mary sings with genuine certainty about an impossible world of justice and peace, as if it's a done deal. Mary hasn't even had the child, and yet she seems strangely, surprisingly composed and confident.

In her poem, "After Annunciation," Madeleine L'Engle writes of this time: "This is the irrational season / When love blooms bright and wild. / Had Mary been filled with reason / There'd have been no room for the child."

The scriptures, the song, the poem all suggest that this is a season to set aside rules, reason, and rigidity. Because there is a truth of love, generosity and compassion that transcends our paltry human limitations—if we will allow our holiest stories, our boldest dreams, our most transcendent songs to bypass our critics, soften our hearts—and *make room for that child!*

Hot Cocoa Prayer

From Advent Unwrapped Resource – The United Church of Canada

Measure two tablespoons of cocoa powder. Taste it (it's bitter).

Pray for some of the things that are bitter in your life and a little hard to take on their own.

Measure and add 1–2 tablespoons of sugar or sweetener. Taste it (it's sweet).

Offer a prayer of thanks for all the things that are sweet in your life and are perhaps best in small doses.

Add a pinch of salt. Taste it (it's salty).

Offer a prayer for moments of grace and clarity, experiences that bring out the flavour of life.

Warm some milk (or dairy free alternative) while reflecting on when you have experienced the Holy in the past day or week. What has warmed your heart?

Mix warmed milk beverage with hot chocolate mixture. Taste it (it's yummy).

Give thanks to God and enjoy.

Sunday, November 12th was a special service of Remembrance at Trinity. Thank you to Marcel MacDonald, who played the *Last Post and Reveille*, and Rob Sanders, who played the *Lament*. and postlude. Laura Farris-Einarson accompanied the National Anthems and hymns on flute, while Marcel MacDonald did likewise on trumpet.

As we approach Advent 1, along with choir members, we are preparing special music for the Advent season, to lead you into Christmas.

The choir is preparing a beautiful **Christmas Cantata - "Love!, a Gospel Christmas Celebration"** on Sunday, December 17th, at our morning worship service. It will be accompanied by an 11 piece musical combo, featuring piano, flute, violin, clarinet, french horn, trumpet, bass and 3 percussionists. A special youth choir, members of our Trinity Youth Group, will join with the Senior Choir in singing several selections from the cantata.

Several members of the combo will also be playing in the J.O.Y. Band Christmas Concert on Sunday, December 3rd. Our "Yuletide Festival" begins at 1:30 p.m. and features a wide variety of secular and sacred music. The concert includes a sing-along. All proceeds will be donated to the Trinity Infant Food Shelf, and the North Bay Santa Fund.

As we've done in past years during Advent, choir members will be leading a pre-service sing-along beginning about 10:15 a.m.

On Christmas Eve, our choir and a group of instrumentalists will provide special seasonal music.

We thank our technical team, led by John Roberts for their time and expertise. John spends many hours each week compiling all the material for each Sunday to ensure that we "get on the air" for YouTube and Cogeco, and hear and see live worship in the sanctuary.

Thank you to our instrumentalists, whose talents have supported the choir throughout the year: Laura Farris-Einarson — flute; Marcel MacDonald – trumpet; and Chris Clarke, Peggy Millar and Matthew Whitehead – percussion.

May the hope, peace, joy and love of this blessed season remain with you and your family throughout the season.

... from the Chair of the Board FF2030 Update and Other Board Happenings

In the fall newsletter we reported on the formation and initial efforts of the FF2030 renewal and building subcommittees and the stewardship committee. All of these groups have been hard at work throughout the fall and we are starting to see some important results.

As you probably know the stewardship initiative resulted in the recent gratitude luncheon and presentation to the congregation to recognize and express thanks for all the volunteer contributions of time and money that help Trinity do God's work. Did you know that Trinity volunteers contributed over 10,593 hours last year to our community and the folks we serve!! That is an amazing number that speaks to how much we can accomplish when we work together. And putting together these figures was just one element of this committee's work as more plans and ideas are being pursued as we recognize the importance of our collective efforts and how thankful we all should be for everyone's contribution. Thanks are owed to John Haflidson, Cindy Brownlee, Rev. Ted and Lisa and Wanda and Rev. Melody from the Canadian Shield Regional Council for all of their amazing efforts to support everyone's contributions.

With respect to the FF2030 renewal subcommittee, if you recall this committee made a decision to focus our congregation renewal efforts on the 25-45 age group and given the way this group typically gets their information, we are making strides towards digitizing our calendars and sharing our information. On Sunday, December 3rd the plan is to describe for the congregation the new calendar function and it shouldn't be too long thereafter that we all should be able to check the calendar from our own homes and update our own schedules to make sure we can participate in as many Trinity events as we wish.

For now, during this development phase we have chosen to restrict the calendar entries to Trinity events and maintain our current processes for deciding which events get listed and in which room and when. As we learn more about how this will all work, we anticipate that additional processes and calendars may develop. Thanks to Alex, Lisa, Wanda and Peggy for all of your efforts to get it to this point.

In addition to the calendar work, a working group has started to ensure that announcements of our various events are making it out to social media. Amanda and Katy, Alex and Lisa have been spearheading this very important work to reach out to our target renewal audience. In addition, the entire renewal subcommittee

has nearly finalized a survey that we will be sending out to folks that don't regularly attend church, so that we can learn more about their spiritual interests and the types of things they might look for in a church community. Interestingly much of the previous research we're reviewing indicates that this age group has maintained their level of interest in spiritual matters over the years. They still wish to explore their spirituality and we hope that they will begin to share our interest in doing God's work here at Trinity.

The building subcommittee is also making strides. At October's board meeting, the board approved the expenditure for a structural engineering study to begin in January. In addition, we provided approvals for contractor expenses in order to open up parts (walls and floors if necessary) of the building to facilitate the engineer's inspection. We are anticipating that this report should be available in March and depending upon its results an assessment of the bricks on the building may follow shortly thereafter. Getting to this stage has required a significant effort and Gerry Foster, Jim Dickson and Bob Cook deserve all of our thanks.

The building subcommittee has also been engaged in an energy audit through Green Economy North. Under the leadership of Bob Cook, Cassie Bott-Baxter and Michelina have gathered and submitted all our energy use data for analysis that will be followed by a building audit. Once complete, with the help of the United Church of Canada Faithful Footprints grant program, we hope to begin implementing some improvements to save energy, money and reduce our carbon footprint.

Cassie Bott-Baxter has also been hard at work analyzing the use of our building and is getting close to sharing her findings with the board. Thank you to Abbi Sanders for collecting all the data from the office calendar, and it's a lot of data as we are a busy place! A few opportunities for additional building uses appear to be developing and we expect that you'll be hearing more about this in the coming. months. Thanks Cassie for seeing that the numbers are getting crunched.

With respect to the FF2030 process we are right in the heart of the information gathering stage with some steps already having begun to be implemented. The next six months should complete many of the things we've been working on, so exciting times are just ahead! Thanks for taking the time to read this report and stay tuned as this exciting journey of renewal continues. All of us involved with the FF2030 process want to wish all of you a joyous Christmas season and an exciting and fulfilling new year.

Finance & Stewardship

We hope that our recent Stewardship Initiative re-affirmed how your gifts of time and money are making a difference in people's lives. This happens in many ways - perhaps nurturing spiritually, helping people grow in faith, providing connection and support or enabling local outreach projects. Your gifts are important and much appreciated.

Thank you to the people who have returned their response cards. For those who are still assessing their Trinity support for 2024, please return the card at your convenience.

In the near future, we will be reviewing this Fall's Stewardship Initiative and discussing ideas for improving it in 2024. If you have any thoughts on this, please talk to a Stewardship team member or email the church office at trinitynorthbay@gmail.com.

The stewardship of money includes the use of both our current income and our accumulated assets. Gifts from our accumulated assets are called "legacy" or "planned" gifts because donors usually make them with considerable forethought and planning. These gifts can help congregations do various things, including funding ongoing ministries or facilitating new ministry programs and opportunities. Types of planned gifts include bequests in wills and gifts of life insurance or RRSPs.

Our Stewardship Team is planning to introduce a Planned Giving Program in early 2024.

Looking at the October 31st YTD financial summary, we see that Total Income is \$292,950 and Offerings account for almost 70% of this. Thank you for your offerings.

Year-to-date Expenses are \$338,400, leaving a deficit of \$45,450. This is \$14,000 less than last month's deficit, thanks in large part to the Apple Pie project. The work of the folks who participated in this project is much appreciated.

The Trinity Infant Food Shelf 2023

Creating Healthy Futures by Providing Infant Essentials Today

Trinity Infant Food Shelf was initially founded in September 2014 by the Trinity Food Bank Advisory Committee, a subcommittee of the Christian Education Committee. Every Wednesday from 10am to noon, volunteers meet with caregivers of infants less than twelve months of age and their families, in the Fellowship Hall to offer access to basic necessities for their infants during the critical first year of life.

This program is offered to caregivers on low income, monthly and includes a gift card for formula or breast-feeding supplies, plus diapers, baby food, baby wipes, bottom cream, baby bottles, baby blankets, soothers, thermometers, infant sleepers, plus a variety of changing items, thanks to the generosity of the North Bay and Trinity Community.

Pregnant women in their last trimester of pregnancy are also assisted in gathering items for a layette so they would be prepared on the birth of their child.

In addition to the material items offered, volunteers also engaged in education on safe sleep, good nutrition for both baby and mom, and up to date information on child development. Assistance to connect with Community supports like Addiction Services, Social Services, CAPC, and Public Health is offered whenever possible. Thanks to Brenda Holbein, Volunteer extraordinaire, we were able to continue supporting our families during the worst of COVID {an eighteen-month period}. Brenda and Lisa met the caregivers at the McIntyre Street door and provided required necessities.

We also had some exciting and successful Fundraisers this summer that included the Charity Day for the Heritage Train and Carousal Company that raised over \$2200 dollars; Christmas in July with Santa and Friends co sponsored by the CAS, and also the Fill A Crib Campaign with the Rotaract in September.

In addition, we have been blessed, receiving many other community donations from the AOTS, Oddfellows, Looksee Checklist, Nipissing Knox United Church, and individual donations of supplies and money.

In Addition, the Infant Food Shelf also works very closely with the Community Action Program for Women, Mother Care Nipissing and the Healthy Baby/Healthy Children Program to assist local families within the district who are unable to visit our site.

The number of families needing assistance continues to fluctuate with over 40 active cases. We estimate assisting over 120 families in 2023 alone.

LENTEN BLUES, 2024



It's been seven years since we've offered a Dickens' reading-- it is back by popular demand. And this one will be worth the wait!




The LONGEST NIGHT Service
