And while (Thank Heavens!) genuine community certainly can be found in bars and social associations, in sports teams and fan clubs and recovery groups-- isn't it essential to genuine Christian fellowship?

(A side thought: Perhaps that village gatekeeper didn't recommend the church, because he hadn't found acceptance there? Or maybe among all his options, no one had suggested to him what the church had to offer?)

In future years, this 2023 Annual Report will tell some of the story of how our Church attempted to live up to our calling-- how we always stretched and tweaked to be a place of wide-armed welcome, of companionship and nourishment along life's trying sojourn. Because of course that's what Jesus offers us, and what we in turn must offer to the world God loves!

That opening story of the unnamed village, the unspecified sojourner and gatekeeper sound like something out of a generic medieval past. But in OUR future, they will all have specific names, identities, talents and needs: companions we have yet to welcome, partnerships to embrace, resources to cultivate, mistakes to forgive, songs as-yet unsung. As always, we build this village, together.

Chairperson's Report


'My name is Glenn Brophey and for those of you that have been not been keeping track, I have been the Chairperson of your Board since last March when I took over from Cindy Brownlee. I have another year in this role. We are thrilled to welcome Amanda Silk as our new Vice-Chair at our AGM, and look forward to her stepping into the Chair's seat a year from now. I feel truly blessed to have these two very capable people helping me in this role and I believe Trinity is incredibly fortunate to have these engaged and talented leaders in place for the foreseeable future.

This past year has been one of recovery and renewal and incredible energy. Unfortunately, these happy events have been punctuated by some heart-wrenching losses as cherished members of Trinity have passed on. These losses remind us of our mortality and how important it is that we seize the day to serve God while we can.

On a happier note, our community seems to be in quite a good place as we recover from the tough times of Covid lockdowns and are beginning to see the fruits of our FF2030 labours. A number of groups continue to organically operate and pull off many great events throughout the year. For example, our vacation bible camp had a very successful year. Our Stewardship and Finance committee has done some outstanding work pulling together a narrative budget to help us understand our numbers better (did you know their October '23 report said we Trinity folks provided 10,593 volunteer hours last year?) and they have put on and are planning several more lunch and learn sessions to serve the elders in our community. In terms of events, this past Christmas, we were very busy with many events, such as the cantata, the children's Christmas pageant, Christmas bag outreach, UCW tea and bazaar, The J.O.Y. band, the Rapport concert, Dicken's dramatic readings and multiple special worship services.

Did you know that for example that on Christmas Eve, we counted over 340 people in Trinity between the morning and the evening services, and, that our Dicken's reading raised over \$8000.00 for the Gathering Place even after we had to turn folks away at the door as we were sold out? We certainly appear to be firmly on the road to recovery as the warmth and welcome of our Trinity community can be seen and felt everywhere. Check out this graph describing in-person Sunday service attendance during 2023. It appears we are making solid progress and that renewal seems to be happening as no matter who they are, or who they love, we continue to welcome more people into our Trinity community.





We have a wonderful staff and ministry team who have moved seamlessly from the challenges presented by the pandemic to this new mode where exciting new things are happening. We are all grateful to see these folks appearing to be energized by the new growth and we see their continued ministering to us as concrete expressions of the beauty and love embodied in our faith.

Thanks again to all of you for your support for our work at the board. We aim to serve your needs to the best of our abilities. And we are particularly heartened that when we ask for your help, Trinity people step up, Look out 2024, here we come!!

Faith Forward 2030 Update

Last year at this time we reported that we were getting close to issuing our first report to the congregation on the FF2030 project. Shortly thereafter the report was released, and we had an after-service luncheon to discuss the information with the congregation. Out of that we were thrilled that 11 members of our community volunteered to work towards the principal FF2030 goals of congregation renewal and establishing a long-term



plan for our building needs. These 11 formed two sub-committees and we have now increased in number as more folks are getting involved in the various initiatives. We are very grateful for all the support for this initiative that has stepped up to address our FF2030 objectives.

A lot has happened since then. The Faith Forward renewal team have chosen to try to attract new or returning members in the 25-45 age group, principally by increasing our on-line footprint through social media, digital calendars and beginning work to revamp our website. In addition, we are very lucky that one of our choir members, Heather McKercher has been working very hard to publicize our Trinity happenings through our local media. We're thrilled to see our 'name in lights' this way as often as possible, so if any of you have a Trinity story to tell that you think would help us raise our profile, please speak to Heather or Rev. Ted for ideas on how we can get our story out.

In terms of the next work of the renewal committee, the website redesign should be well underway by the time you are reading this and work is ongoing to increase our social media presence. The committee also launched a Trinity-specific survey to find out what 25-45 year olds are looking for to find their spiritual connection or church community. We will be considering these results and the findings from other renewed churches as we develop our future messaging strategies and plans for new programs. In short, we have made some important progress, but we also have some important decisions ahead of us before we can make these new methods of communicating part of a 'new normal' for Trinity.

The other focus of the FF2030 work is oriented toward securing our long-term plan for our building. The Faith Forward Building sub-committee has been focusing on four main initiatives. One – Structural analysis of this big beautiful old building. The board has approved the hiring of a structural engineer and construction contractor to have a good hard look at our building. We want a realistic look at the future of our beautiful

old building so we can plan for our Trinity community to have a safe place to worship and play until 2030 and beyond.

This will lead to our second initiative - examining the bricks. Once we have a solid idea about our building from our structural analysis, we can then move onto an in-depth investigation into the bricks on the exterior of the building.

The third initiative is an energy audit through Green Economy North. Energy usage data was collected, and a "Greenhouse Gas Initial Inventory Report" was received in December. The next step is a physical review of the building to create a report that will highlight areas of improvement and initiatives to help us save energy. Working with the United Church of Canada's Faithful Footprints program, we can access some funding grants to help improve the energy efficiency of this big beautiful old building.

And the fourth initiative involves reviewing and analyzing the usage of our building. Who uses it, when and in which spaces? We are working to identify ways to increase the rental opportunities by maximizing the spaces we have available to us, streamlining the process involved in renting those spaces and then working with the renewal team to promote the use of our church spaces.

The work of the FF2030 renewal committee over the next year is likely to result in some 'new normal' activities becoming established. It's entirely likely that some of these new activities will need some ongoing leadership so please consider how you might be able to help as we try new programs and keep other existing programs energized and led with intent to serve others in the Trinity way.

On the building side, the work we do this year is bound to lead a project that will carry on throughout 2025 to see it completed. Taking the time to thoroughly investigate where we are today will help us prioritize and plan for our future.

These are exciting times and while a bit nerve-racking we are heartened by what appears to be the beginning of the fruits of our efforts. We see growth happening throughout Trinity and we get the sense from all of you that you share in our excitement for the future as we make plans to see that Trinity's good works continue to 2030 and beyond.

United Community Faith Network - UCFuN Local United Church Work Group

In the fall of 2022, two lay leaders representing the board or council from each of the North Bay and area United Churches gathered to build stronger connections, get to know each other better, plan for the future, and build community. This group representing Trinity, St. Andrews North Bay, Emmanuel, Omond and Carmichael has been meeting quarterly.

Shared worship services began in January 2023 when we joined together at Emmanual United Church for our first '5 th Sunday of the month' shared worship service. This group, with the support of each congregation has facilitated the 5 th Sunday of the month shared worship service where we all close our doors and worship together united, at one United Church. Usually with joint choirs, good food and great fellowship. St Andrews North Bay hosted the 5 th Sunday in April 2023, Carmichael hosted a lovely outdoor service in July, Trinity in October and Omond in December. There are plans to continue with these shared services for the 5 th Sundays in 2024.

This group coordinated the team that assembled and distribution over 1000 candy cane reindeer at the downtown Christmas walk. An opportunity for the North Bay United Churches to work together to wish the citizens of North Bay a Merry Christmas.

As we continue to meet we are working together to ensure a vibrant United Church presence in North Bay for many years to come.

Canadian Shield Regional Council (CRSC 2023)

A regional council is a decision-making body responsible to serve and support Communities of Faith within it bounds and provide necessary oversight. The CSRC is one of 16 regions spread across Canada. It consists of the pastoral charges in the former Manitou Conference, Algoma Presbytery and those in the Eastern Time Zone of the former Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Conference. We in Manitou Conference thought we had a large area but now we are really challenged to figure out how to be a cohesive group within a bigger area.

Membership consists of all ministry personnel both active and retired in the region plus lay representatives from each Community of Faith. Lay membership is based on the number of resident members in the Community of Faith. Trinity has 2 representatives and does qualify for 4 representatives. Don Haslam and Janice Brownlee are the lay representatives from Trinity. In November Don Haslam resigned from this role as he and his wife Sandy relocated to southern Ontario. We are in need of new representatives. If you would be interested in learning more about this role, please speak to Janice and she will be happy to describe what the work entails. I would encourage you to give this need serious thought. It is a rewarding role and you develop relationships with other UC folks from our region.

The CSRC's governance structure consists of an Executive, a Pastoral Relations Commission (Rev. Ted is a member of this commission) and a Support to Communities of Faith Commission. There are resource teams for Right Relations (Lisa Blais is team lead), Mission Grants, Finance, Property (Rev Gord Roberts is team lead), Affirming, Youth and Young Adult. Please refer to the website at *canadianshieldrc.ca* for more information on the structure, function and membership of the Resource Teams. New members are always being sought.

Canadian Shield RC shares resources with Shining Waters RC. Shining Waters RC is just to the south of us and includes Toronto. Rev Peter Hartmans is the Executive Minister for both regional councils. Administrative staff are shared by both and there are plans for joint learning events and other opportunities to gather and work together.

The first Festival of Faith of the new region occurred in June, 2023. The event was held here at Canadore College and was attended by individuals from across the region and also from Shining Waters. The event was well attended. It was a wonderful weekend of music, speakers, workshops and culminated with a worship service at Trinity on Sunday morning. The hope is that this will become a semi regular event. The next one is set for 2025 in Sudbury and this time will be in partnership with Shining Waters RC. Both regional councils are represented on the planning committee.

The 2023 Annual Meeting occurred by ZOOM in November 2023. The meeting included discussion and vote on remit 1. This remit establishes an autonomous National indigenous Organization within the governance structure of the United Church. At the end of this meeting Rev Nancy Ferguson from Sault Ste Marie was installed as chair of the RC for a 2year term. Detailed information about the meeting can be found on the regional council website. The next Regional Council meeting is scheduled for May, 2024. It will be an in person meeting and held in Sault Ste Marie.

ZOOM meetings will continue to be an important part of our way of connecting given the size of our region. We are still learning how to do our work in this new structure and it is important that we continue to evaluate how we are doing and how we can improve the way we do our work.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairperson Cindy Brownlee at 1:00 pm.

"Trinity United Church acknowledges that we are meeting on aboriginal land that has been inhabited by Indigenous people from the beginning. As settlers, we are grateful for the opportunity to meet here and we thank all the generations of people who have taken care of this land – for thousands of years. In particular, we gather on the traditional territory of the Nipissing First Nation Anishinaabe. This territory is covered by the Robinson-Huron Treaty of 1850.

WORSHIP: Rev Ted led us in the gathering worship.

APPOINTMENT of RECORDING SECRETARY:

MOTION: Don Haslam/Eunice Laporte moved that Janice Brownlee be appointed the Recording Secretary for the 2023 Annual Congregational Meeting of Trinity United Church, North Bay. **CARRIED**

Brad Stenning and Rick Shaver reported that they have reviewed the financial statements of Trinity United Church and those of the committees and groups within Trinity United Church and have found them to reflect the financial position of each of the groups.

The reviewers recognized the work done by Michelina Beam, treasurer of Trinity United Church.

APPOINTMENT of REVIEWERS for the Year 2023

FINANCIAL REPORTS:

John Haflidson reviewed the financial summary report for 2022. Total income of \$387,134 and expenses of \$391,928 leaving us with a deficit of \$4,794. He expressed thanks to the amazing Trinity family for their generous donations throughout the year. He expressed appreciation to the Finance/Stewardship Committee and acknowledged the work of Michelina Beam, treasurer in ensuring all our financial obligations were met. The floor was opened for comments and questions.

PROPOSED BUDGET for 2023:

A summary of the proposed budget 2023 was presented by Treasurer Michelina Beam. Income for 2023 was estimated at \$393,300 and expenses at \$410,224 leaving a deficit 0f \$16,924. The United Church assessment is

\$15,700. There is \$29,000 budgeted for the ceiling repair (this is the ceiling in the hallway, nursery and offices), brick repair and camera, streaming equipment.

The floor was opened for questions and discussion.

Building and Grounds Report

Many thanks go out to the Building and Grounds team who ensure our building is cared for and safe for all to use.

You may have noticed that we did not proceed with any brickwork this past summer. The primary reason for this was that we are working closely with the Faith Forward 2030 building sub-committee to explore best options to reface the building. All options are costly, so we want to ensure we make the right choice.

Not working on the bricks does not mean that our team was lacking in projects. Along with regular maintenance we continued to work on special one-off tasks. Many of these were brought forward by the congregation to a B&G member. Once alerted, work was prioritized and completed as soon as possible.

Some work around the church that you may have noticed includes: painting of the McIntyre entrance and administration office (it had been 30+ years since it was last done), replacing fixtures and lights to LED as they burn out, repairing the stove and caulking windows to decrease heat loss.

Some significant expenditures were made this past year in the way of contracts. First was contracting with a firm who ensures that our boiler system is treated with the right chemicals. Regular testing now occurs and this will hopefully prolong the service life of system.

Our second major contract this past year was for an energy audit and review. Completing an energy audit is part of the requirements to receive a United Church grant under the Faithful Footprints program where we can receive up to \$20,000 in grant money buy matching 1/3 of the total claimed amount. Upgrades must go towards decreasing our carbon footprint. As part of the audit, we found that 98% of our energy costs are spent in natural gas or 57 tonnes of CO 2 e in 2022. (This will be our baseline moving forward). Our energy audit has provided some suggestions on how we can reduce our greenhouse gas emissions. We will be working on a plan to address these over the next year to ensure we maximize the grant funds.

The Christian Education and Outreach Committee at Trinity United Church is responsible for coordinating and overseeing programs for children, youth, and adults. We support the work of our Food Shelf ministries through special offerings such as Lent, Thanksgiving, and White Gift Sunday.

Thank you to the many volunteers who facilitated our programs in 2023, such as Trinity Food Shelf, Infant Food Bank, Sunday School, Trinity Families, Mustard Seed, Vacation Bible Camp, Messy Church and Rally Back Picnic.

Reports from the Sunday School, Youth Group, Vacation Bible Camp, and Mustard Seed can be found later in this report.

Spirit Point 2023 was a resounding success and had been very much missed during the COVID lock-downs. Thank you to the AOTS who provided for their generous donation to help offset the costs for the weekend.

Investigate and promote ways in which the Congregation may serve the local community.

Trinity operates a Monday Food Shelf program and a Wednesday Infant Food Shelf program. Reports for both of these programs can be found later in this report.

Anne Smith and Sue Miller represent Trinity on the Compassionate Committee for the Homeless of North Bay. Along with members from a number of other faith communities throughout the area who have joined together to address the immediate needs of the homeless (see individual report).

With the support from Trinity Youth, we provide over 150 Christmas gift bags for those who might otherwise not receive the joy of getting a gift at Christmas. The Christmas Bag Outreach program provided gifts to a variety of local agencies.

Promote the Lenten, Thanksgiving, White Gift, and the Trinity Food Shelf offerings

We thank the congregation for their generous donations to these programs throughout the year. Our Food Shelf programs operate solely on donations from the Trinity congregation and wider community. The White Gift program helped provide over 150 gifts in our community.

Finance & Stewardship Report

Our preliminary 2023 financial report shows annual Income of \$387,785. Thank you to all the people who donated or contributed to generate this income. Your contributions are much appreciated!

Total income was 1% below budget but 2% greater than last year. Offerings of \$282,234 accounted for 73% of total income and was 2% below budget. Fundraising income was \$27,175 while building rentals accounted for \$13,620.

Thank you to the Trinity groups - AOTS, UCW, and Joy Band - for your continuing donations and dedication to our church community. Total expenses of \$412,535 were .5% greater than budget even with the decision not to spend a budgeted amount of \$29,000 on building brick work until further assessments are carried out. Annual expenses were 4.5% higher than in 2022, with notable increases for Personnel, Property, the Food Shelf and Infant Food Shelf.

Comparing total 2023 income and expenses resulted in a deficit of \$24,750. This is a substantial reduction of the deficit from the over \$50,000 reported several months ago and we would like to acknowledge the tremendous generosity of Trinity folks toward the end of the year. THANK YOU!!

On a positive note, we received a grant from the federal government in the form of loan forgiveness of \$20,000 as we met the repayment deadline for the Canadian Emergency Business Account loan. This grant has brought our in-year deficit down to \$4,750. Please note that this amount and the above figures may change slightly after year-end adjustments by Treasurer Michelina and final evaluations by our auditors.

Several members of the committee contributed to the Fall Stewardship Initiative, which is reported on elsewhere in this Annual Report.

The Finance and Stewardship Committee meets monthly to carry out the functions outlined in the Church By-Laws. Members in 2023 were: Bill Brownlee, Michelina Beam, Natalya Brown, John Haflidson, Gordon Roberts and Brenda Holbein. We were greatly saddened when Brenda passed away in November. Our treasurer is Michelina Beam and our envelope and Par Administrator is Wanda Gleason.

Stewardship

Trinity is being served by an enthusiastic Stewardship team that was reinvigorated in March of 2023 when Rev Ted, John Haflidson and Cindy Brownlee participated in **Called to be the Church: Stewardship Best Practices** lead by Melody Duncanson-Hales. This training included four-sessions totalling



more than 8 hours that left the team filled with energy and great ideas. Trinity received a Stewardship Analysis Report that contained some fascinating and inspiring information. This team was later joined by Natalya Brown.

Some lessons learned during the stewardship training included;

• Stewardship vs Fundraising

Fundraising is about trying to get a certain amount of money from people for a specific task or project or focus on budgets. Although fundraising has its purposes, it can feel never-ending and cause us to focus too much on 'balancing the books' for its own sake.

Stewardship is Discipleship. Giving that continues to position generosity and stewardship as key spiritual practices for disciples of Jesus, calling us to live all aspects of our life in the light of faith in Jesus.

- Focusing on **our mission**: using specific inspiring examples of how we're changing the world. In the charity world they call this building your "case for support." In other words, start with your mission and purpose, not with paying your bills or budget realities. "Claim your mission!"
- The vital importance of **thanking givers**. We are very thankful for out church family who continuously give of their times, talents and treasure!

The stewardship team created "When is a pie more than a pie?" labels for our Apple Pie project to celebrate our mission by sharing some of they ways purchasing an apple pie supports life at Trinity. Contributing to building leaders, supporting outreach, building community, celebrating music and more.

The Stewardship team brought you the gratitude lunch in October to thank you for all you do and to share a package that included our narrative budget - a visual opportunity to see our gifts of time and money and where they go and what they do! Wow, Trinity is an amazing place. In 2022, the gifts of money to our mission includes \$410,222 representing 37% Outreach, 31% Worship, 20% faith formation and 12% Pastoral Care. The gifts of time to our mission were equally as impressive with a total of 10,593 hours representing 40% Worship, 27% Outreach, 20% Faith Formation and 12% Pastoral Care. The package also included a letter from Ted, a financial giving's step chart and a response card. We were please to receive response cards from 55 families. People who have committed to continue or increase their gifts of time and/or treasure to Trinity.

We are fortunate at Trinity to have a wonderful cohesive staff. They help to make our church a welcoming place in so many ways.

Pastoral Care and Visiting Report

The Pastoral Care and Visiting Committee is a dedicated group of people who are committed to expressing a ministry of compassion and caring with people who consider themselves a part of the Trinity family, giving primary attention to seniors who are at risk of experiencing isolation. Expressions of care happen through telephone calls, special occasion cards as well as in person visits. Each committee member has a list of people with whom they stay in touch, offering regular empathetic listening support and encouragement. At present the list includes 71 people aged 80 and over.

We arrange to make special visits, if possible, on the birthdays of people who are 90 or over. There are currently 21 people on this list and one person, Geneva Thompson deserves special mention since she celebrated her 100 th birthday this year! Bill Brownlee continues to provide beautiful personalized cards and they are always appreciated.

Several people from our committee also make weekly visits to Trinity folk who are receiving care in hospital and relevant information is shared with Rev. Ted and with Lisa. Our group also takes responsibility for inviting volunteers from the congregation to come to the church a little earlier on Sunday morning so that when people walk through the door to attend worship, they are given a warm and friendly greeting.

Plans are underway to identify people who are not able to attend church services and who would like to borrow a hymn book from the church and / or receive a communion kit for their own experience of participating in worship at home through online streaming or via cable TV. Communion kits will be delivered for those who would find these helpful.

Our group has gathered bimonthly and during our meetings we have updated our contact lists and encouraged one another through sharing experiences of our interactions with folks from the congregation and as well as noting special needs for pastoral care.

Recognition and gratitude for this valuable activity of expressing God's love is extended to Joanne Bernier, Karen Brophey, Claudette Brown, Carolyn Crawford, Rob Farris, Wanda Gleason, Maurice Laporte, Viola MacVicar, Jean Mitchell, Sandi Rozicki, Pat Sadler and John Sheridan.

In addition we were blessed by the lively presence and contributions of Brenda Holbein, who sadly passed into spirit in November of this past year. Her cheerful enthusiasm was deeply appreciated and she has been very much missed.

Worship Report

The committee consists of Rev. Dr. Ted Harrison, Betty Farris, Wanda Gleason, Chris Ford, Barb Roberts, Marian Robinson, Rod Carley, Heather McKercher, Karen Brophey and Bonnie Rae Bailey. Thank you to these people for their time and effort to help Trinity's services run efficiently, while making it safe and welcoming.

The committee regretfully said goodbye to 2 members as of May 30 th when Marian Robinson and Rod Carley moved away from North Bay. We thank them for their contribution and dedication to Worship at Trinity since 2019. Bonnie Rae Bailey's term of 6 years is complete as of the Annual General Meeting.

The committee meets with Rev. Ted to ensure that all areas of the worship service are carried out effectively. The Worship committee is responsible for acquiring ushers, lay readers, and the lift operators, preparing the chancel for each service, preparing Communion, assisting with Baptism services, and establishing policies regarding use and care of the sanctuary.

Pandemic protocols did not affect how worship was conducted this year. Attendance on Sunday mornings continued to increase through the year from a low of 49 on January 1 st to a high of 232 on Christmas Eve.

Rev. Kathy McCallum and Rev. Lillian Roberts led the services while Rev. Ted was away; Rev. Kathy on February 19 and Rev. Lillian on June 18. Brenda McLay filled in for Betty on May 14.

Communion was served on February 26 for Lent, April 9 for Easter, June 11 for United Church of Canada's Anniversary, Oct 1 for Worldwide Communion, December 3 for Advent, and Dec 24 for Christmas. All these services used prefilled Communion cups with juice and wafer. The cost of these were generously donated by a Trinity member. This year Christmas Eve Communion was served during the morning service, instead of after the evening service.

Baptism was performed on May 14 and October 8. The heavy stone Baptismal Font is difficult to move and is not easily accessible. We received the Baptismal Font from Elliott Lake's Holy Trinity United when that church was closing. The Elliott Lake congregation took some comfort in the fact that the font was going to be used the following Sunday, May 14 for a Baptism when it left Elliott Lake.

On June 11, the 98 th Anniversary of United Church of Canada was celebrated by serving Communion as it is annually at Trinity. This year, the Sunday coincided with the Canadian Shield Region's Festival of Faith in North Bay. Rev. Marlene Britton, Diaconal minister from General Council was the preacher with Linnea Good, United Church of Canada's musician and songwriter leading a ukulele choir.

On the 5th Sundays of any month during 2023, the local United Churches worshiped together. January 29 was at Emmanuel, April 30 at St. Andrew's, July 30 was an outdoor service at Carmichael, October 29 at Trinity and December 31 at Omond. Many people participated in this opportunity to gather together in faith and fellowship.

Other joint services were the Good Friday service at Omond. The Longest Night Service on December 21 is held at Trinity but is joint with St. Andrew's and this year attendance was doubled from previous years.

During July and August, St. Andrew's and Trinity continued the long-standing arrangement to share Pastoral Care and Worship over the summer months while each church is closed for holidays. In 2023, Trinity was closed in August.

The Joy Band and the full choir provided the music for the Remembrance Day Service on November 12. AOTS led the service on November 26.

Sandy Haslam decorated the sanctuary beautifully for spring and fall. Lillian Roberts lent her tasteful decorating skills for Thanksgiving. In preparation for Advent, the sanctuary was attractively decorated for Christmas under the direction of Nancy Dewar-Stenning. She was assisted by Noreen and Ross Brewer, Glad Banks-Bryer, Keith Bryer, Barb and John Roberts, Lillian Roberts, Cathy Brewer, Darlene Laferriere, Dave McKenney, Heather McKercher, Kirk and Sue Elliott and Rick Banting.

The 4 weeks of Advent included Communion (Hope), White Gift and Children's Pageant (Peace), Choir Cantata (Joy) and Christmas Eve (Love).

The Stewardship Committee asked for a tally of volunteer hours from our committee, and it was discovered that our small group coordinates more than 350 volunteer hours per year to schedule ushers, lift operators, and Readers. Add to that the hours that the individual committee members use to schedule the weekly volunteers, attend meetings, prepare Communion, write reports, and other responsibilities as outlined in the bylaws. Trinity is truly blessed.

A special thank you to Sue Miller who has used her considerable experience to manage the "front of the house" every Sunday.

Thank you to Rev. Ted. We appreciate his leadership, wisdom, compassion, and humour. Thank you to Betty Farris, who along with the choir added so much to the services with their music. The Worship Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the congregation for their willingness to carry out the necessary tasks for the worship services.

Ensuring that we maintain adequate and appropriate coverage will require close attention from the Trustees this coming year.

Monday Morning Food Shelf Report

Our Food Shelf was deeply saddened by the death of long time Food Shelf shopper and dear friend Jean Rideout this fall. We are grateful for all her support over the years, along with her husband Don, who shopped and delivered food each week. Jean is deeply missed.

The Monday Food Shelf, as an essential service to those in need in our community, continues to offer food support throughout the year. In 2023 the Monday Food Shelf saw a substantial increase in the number of users to our Food Bank services. We provided food assistance to a total of 1225 persons. Recently we have been seeing an increase in people experiencing homelessness using our Food Shelf. Church food banks and the Gathering Place are currently the only organizations that are able to provide food to those without an address. We have also recently seen an increase in International Students accessing our Food Supports. We are grateful to Canadore College for donating \$5000 to help offset this added cost to our program.

Thank you to the Trinity congregation and the wider community who have donated to the Food Shelf throughout the year. We are grateful to local community groups and individuals who donate items and cash to help stock our shelves. Infant Food Shelf Report

Since September 2014 the Trinity Infant Food Shelf has been assisting vulnerable families and their infants until one year of age, providing critical baby supplies as well as education and support. The Infant Food Shelf is open at Trinity weekly on Wednesdays from 10am to 12noon. Any family or caregiver requesting assistance can access the IFS monthly. In 2023 we served 46 families.

We are pleased to work with community agencies including CAS (Children's Aid Society), CAPC (Community Action Program for Children), ICDP (Infant and Child Development Program) and HBHC (Healthy Babies Healthy Children) who support clients to access the program.

Our roster of volunteers includes Linda McLay and Anne Smith Co Chairs, Janice Brownlee, Bonnie-Rae Bailey, Pat Clysdale, Darlene Floyd, Judi Rose, Gael Dicht and Barbara Brunette who provide hands on support and education to the families that attend. Our volunteers also support the Infant Clothing Boutique which is operated monthly by CAS on Elmwood.

Many thanks to Sharen Liddell who provides her sewing skills to make Infant Sleep Sacs as well as cozy blankets and to Pat Clysdale who keeps us well supplied with books which are much appreciated by the clients. Some new sewers have also approached us about volunteering their skills so Sharen is supporting that process.

Anne Smith and Sue Miller are members of the Compassionate Committee on behalf of Trinity United Church North Bay. They participate in monthly meetings which include a guest speaker who speaks to what is needed in the community or what their organization is doing to help the homeless in North Bay.

Backpacks of Love: The committee of volunteers packed 50 backpacks filled with donated toothbrushes, toothpaste, soaps, antiperspirant, lip balm, socks and more. Bags were dropped off at North Bay Crisis Centre, the Indigenous Friendship Centre, the Gathering Place and the Aids Committee of North Bay.

Winter Boot Campaign: Five car trunks were filled with hats, mitts, scarves, and thermal socks, and 100 pairs of brand-new winter boots were donated to the homeless.

Trinity AOTS gave a generous donation of \$200 to the Winter Boot Campaign and it helped purchase many new boots.

Organizations like The Aids Committee of North Bay, Healthy Community Ambassador Program, Open Arms Café, Boots on the Ground and Hope Awaits Ministries Men's Shelter were very excited and thankful to receive the brand-new mitts, thermal socks, and boots to clothe the homeless in the frigid winter weather

The Compassionate Committee for the Homeless of North Bay is very grateful to Trinity who agreed to provide space and support for hosting an information evening at Trinity in early November called "What you need to know about helping people who are experiencing homelessness". We had around 60 - 75 people attend even though there was a snow storm on that day. The committee is planning to have another information session November, 2024.

A Quick Reference Guide is kept current and lists community resources available for people experiencing homelessness. The Compassionate Committee also does activities related to promoting social justice for those experiencing homelessness. A letter has been sent to all levels of government urging them to keep recommendations in the National Housing Accord a priority. Also a letter was sent to the Council asking that some of the Casino funds be used for affordable housing and supports for people experiencing homelessness and a letter is being drafted re the importance of a Guaranteed Liveable Income.
